Introduction to 3D Printing


\$5, Monday, Feb. 12, 6-7:30pm, School Library

made from milk, sugar, cinnamon, and vanilla, is commonly used as a filling for these canoes. This dessert is appreciated for its combination of sweet and spiced flavors, creating a delightful gastronomic experience typical of Salvadoran culture.

Old-World, Poppyseed Coffee Cake 10am-noon

Polish Poppy Seed Coffee cake (makowiec) has been a tradition in Erin's grandmother's family for decades, if not centuries. And now that she knows how to make it, she wants to spread the joy and teach others how to make it too.

Makowiec is a strudel-like, yeast cake filled with ground poppy seeds. Although recipes for these cakes are found throughout his-

tory in Eastern and Central Euro-



pean countries, Poles consider them a traditionally Polish dessert.

Participants will learn how to make Old-World Polish Poppy Seed Coffee Cake (also known as Makoweic) from veast dough to finished loaf.

NATIVE AMERICANS IN THE LAKE PEPIN AREA \$5, Wednesday, February 28, 6:00-7:00pm, School Library

Join us for a presentation on Native American heritage of our area. There has been a rich and turbulent history of different cultural groups over thousands of years. There were Archaic and Woodland cultures in the area with villages in Pepin. Mr. Pesic will share what he has learned about the Mound Builders and will share many stories such as: the last stand of Chief Great Ojibwa; Dakota warrior Tamaha who was an American hero of the War of 1812; how Chief Wapasha I got his name; how his son Wapasha II lost his eye; the story of Maiden Rock; the legend of the "Grave of the Dog Hill" and many more stories, myths, and legends from Indian Nations that lived here.

Instructor: Goran Pesic is a resident of Pepin, father of two, and Social Studies Teacher in Pepin Area Schools interested in local history including the broader area of Lake Pepin. He was born in Belgrade, Serbia, and has been a resident of Pepin since 2003. He loves science and history, and besides *Once Upon a Lake in Pepin* he wrote other historical accounts including textbooks that his students use in school.
